

in Iraq.



Dr. Herman J. Saatkamp, President



The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey's Board of Trustees appointed Dr. Herman J. Saatkamp Jr. as the fourth President of the College in June, 2003.

Previously, Dr. Saatkamp was the Dean of the Indiana University School of Liberal Arts in Indianapolis where he led 11 departments and 22 centers and institutes, including the IU Center on Philanthropy and several public policy institutes. He also held an appointment in the Department of Medical and Molecular Genetics in the IU School of Medicine.

I had a chance to sit down with President Saatkamp which is a huge privilege considering his very demanding and hectic schedule, to talk about the Hospitality Management Program here at Stockton.

Hospitality Management is one of the more important majors considering the area in which we live. With Atlantic City and many other shore destinations just around the corner there are many career opportunities in Hospitality Management. He is very pleased with the direction of the program. Stockton is not only offering Hospitality Management courses on the main campus, they also offer professional development programs and MBA electives at the Carnegie Library in Atlantic City. 

Hospitality Management Lecture Series Begins

This semester the Hospitality Management Lecture Series for the Hospitality Management Society kicked off with Victor Tiffany; Vice President of Food and Beverage Operations for the Borgata Hotel, Casino, and Spa in Atlantic City.

On March 24, Victor Tiffany, spoke to a full house at the Townsend Residential Life Center at the Richard Stockton College of New Jersey. The audience included students, (mostly Hospitality Management), faculty, staff, administration, President Saatkamp and his wife, Dot.

Mr. Tiffany is a graduate of Cornell University's School of Hotel Administration, trained at the Hotel De Paris in Monte Carlo, Windows on the World and studied classical French cooking at the Cordon Bleu in Paris.

Among other accomplishments, Mr. Tiffany served as Restaurant Director for New York City's acclaimed Tribeca Grill, under Robert DeNiro's ownership, from 1989-95. Later, as Director of Special Projects, he opened Myriad's Nobu Next Door, TriBakery and Layla in New York City, Nobu London and San Francisco's Rubicon, owned in part by Robin Williams, Robert DeNiro and Francis Ford Coppola.


He started out by explaining his experiences in the hospitality industry and how he began his career. He gave great advice to the students in the Hospitality Management field, including finding a mentor. He also explained

that with intelligence and the right attitude anyone can gain the needed experience to be successful in life. He spoke about key points to remember in leadership and warned students not to worry about salaries, rather to "enjoy what you do and the money will follow." Tiffany suggested that the best way to manage is to make your employees care; then they will work harder for you.

Tiffany also spoke about the Borgata; their strategies and their future plans. The Borgata has been an innovator in the casino industry in Atlantic City and has set an example of what to expect in the future of Atlantic City. He explained that the operation is soon going to expand to more than twice the number of rooms and restaurant seats; which will bring many opportunities for Hospitality Management interns and graduates in the future.

After he spoke, Mr. Tiffany fielded questions from the audience and personally talked with many soon to be graduates about opportunities available at the Borgata. On behalf of the Hospitality Management Society, Professor Scales, the coordinator of the Lecture Series, presented Mr. Tiffany with a plaque in appreciation for his coming to Stockton to share his experiences and insights.

Along with our booth for Stockton, various other culinary and management schools were there in hopes of recruiting potential new students. The culinary schools had some amazing food on display and there was cooking demonstrations throughout the three days of the show. Countless industry representatives had displays ranging from simplistic to extravagant. If you are interested in the latest of kitchen trends as I am, this show was for you! One could find the latest in equipment such as refrigerators, freezers, double boilers, guest room furniture, kitchen uniforms, bars, company vans, and so forth. Matt and I attended a career fair and two seminars the first day of the show. The first seminar explained the techniques of how to market yourself as a brand name. This looks great when interviewing for new jobs, as well as maintaining a presence in your current job. Dr. Pam Cummings and Associate Professor at the Hotel, Restaurant, and Institutional Management University of Delaware presented the second seminar that we attended. She discussed proper business

Recently I had the chance to speak with Howard Bacharach, Executive Director of the Atlantic City Hotel and Lodging Association (ACHLA). The ACHLA is a trade and networking association that was founded in 1898 as the Atlantic City Hotelman's Association. Currently, the primary objective of the Association is the funding an Education Scholarship Program that benefits students who are pursuing a hospitality or culinary education. Howard was a great source of information for the recent hospitality graduate. He was quick to stress that someone can't graduate college and walk into a general manager's job, and that formal education combined with the "been there, done that" of working in the industry is the way to go. "Being in the right place at the right time has a lot to do with it", Howard said, "and it's difficult because there aren't many individuals graduating college that can afford not to earn a proper compensation to live out the timeframe it takes to move up the chain. It's difficult."



Howard Bacharach, Executive Director of the Atlantic City Hotel and Lodging Association When I asked how much a degree matters compared to the proverbial street smarts of having work experience, the answer was very subjective: "It all depends what the position is. I would think in the marketing end, they would look for someone with a degree. At a front desk or in the front office, that might not be a priority. A degree always helps and I'll never knock education, but it all depends what the priority is and on the individual. And that's not only true in the hotel area, but also in the culinary area."

On Stockton: "I believe we have a good working relationship with Stockton. We do provide scholarships and there were several scholarships awarded to Stockton students this past year. I think we have a good relationship with the new President, Dr. Saatkamp. Before he arrived in Atlantic City. I had chosen him to be the speaker at our annual Awards Luncheon. Dr. Whithem and Professor Scales are both active members of the Association, and Professor Albano was a big supporter of ours when she was at Atlantic Cape Community College, and when she moved to Stockton last year she stayed just as involved. We're also building a new relationship with the Carnegie Library."





There are some very big changes that will soon be taking place at Stockton. Currently, F-wing is undergoing renovation and renewal. There will be two floors added to the current structure, consisting of new classrooms and computer labs. Instead of contracting the job to the NJ Division of Property Management & Construction (DPMC), we have contracted it to

the Gilbane Company.

This is the first time we are doing business with a private company. We negotiated a very good contract with them. The

DPMC pledges full support. Stockton has purchased the old Verizon building located on Jimmie Leed's Road. This building will be converted to support offices not needed on campus, making room for more classrooms. Half of the offices in J200 will be converted to classrooms, among others.

A final draft of the contract to rent 300 Shore Road to Gilda's Club has been completed and is awaiting approval. 300 Shore Road is the property Stockton owns, which used to house our previous president, Vera King Ferris. The contract is for one year and calls for Gilda's Club to pay \$2,100 a month.

Sunday, December 19th was the largest graduation in Stockton's history. On Martin Luther King Day, Stockton held a Day of Service, asking students and community members to donate their time to worthy causes. This was very successful.

Finally, a very detailed facilities master plan was just approved. This will literally change the face of Stockton in years to come. It includes three parking garages, a student center, a science building, an art gallery, and many other academic buildings.
