# **Achievements and Accolades**

Congratulations go out this month to several of our current students and alumni who have shared news about their recent achievements. Both Brittany LaPorte and Jessica Sawyer earned their initial teacher certifications from Stockton's TEDU program, and each reports that she is enjoying her teaching career, Brittany at Pleasantville Middle School and Jessica at Washington Township High School.

Currently enrolled Master of Arts in Instructional Technology (MAIT) students Tara Williams, Dawn Watkins and Darnley Rosius have also recently completed work on e-learning modules that all three have shared in their workplaces, right here at Stockton. Tara created a "Stockton Friendly" training module to promote excellent customer service in the Graduate School, and Dawn collaborated with Darnley to design training modules designed to raise Plant Management Staff awareness and safety practices regarding bloodborne pathogens.

Another current MAIT student, William Perkins, has just been recognized from NORAD for a Best Practice. Based on skills he learned in Dr. Ackerman's classes, Bill designed a concept map and curator to consolidate information relative to command and control, which will become a benchmark as well.

Stockton students Christine Ross and Melissa Scully (MAED) will accompany their faculty member Dr. Susan Cydis to the Teacher Education Division of the Council for Exceptional Children conference in Fort Lauderdale to present two sessions of their research on November 7 and 8.

Dr. Ron Caro (TEDU) provided panelist responses to the documentary film *A Place at the Table* focused on food security issues, screened at Stockton earlier this month. Current program director of *Teacher Training with a Mission*, Dr. Caro will also be presenting his work with his TTM co-founder Dr. John Quinn (MAED) at the International Organization of Social Sciences and Behavioral Research conference in New Orleans, October 14-15. This fall, more than a dozen Stockton students have signed on to TTM to provide individual tutoring to children living at the Atlantic City Rescue Mission.

Program Coordinator (TEDU) Dr. Norma Boakes has recently completed the nation's first Council for Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) evaluator training program, and has already been tapped to audit the Greenville College of Education in Illinois during December. # New Jersey Department of Education Regulatory Changes



# State of New Jersey DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Interested in a free two-hour NJDOE workshop on SGOs? Supervisors and Principals are invited to attend one of two "Train the Trainer" Regulatory sessions on October 8 from <u>1-3pm</u> or <u>4-6pm</u> at the Stockton Campus Center. The Department of Education recently proposed regulatory changes to raise the bar for entry into the teaching profession, while ensuring adequate flexibility for candidates and programs; and increase the rigor of certification requirements.

The purpose of the rules is to ensure all novice teachers meet a *minimum* bar for knowledge and pedagogical skills prior to entering the classroom. The proposed amendments to N.J.A.C. 6A:9-8.1 and 10.1 are intended to increase the standards both for entry into teacher preparation programs and for certification. Proposed changes are these:

- raising the cumulative grade point average (GPA) from at least a 2.75 to at least 3.00 for candidates graduating after September 1, 2014
- 2) requiring candidates to pass a Commissioner-

approved assessment of basic reading, writing, and mathematics skills (Praxis Core Academic Skills) or equivalent 1660 on the SAT, or 23 on the ACT

 requiring that all candidates graduating after September 1, 2015, pass a Commissionerapproved performance assessment.

# Spotlight on Collaborative Student Teaching

As schools throughout the state continue to adjust to the Achieve NJ mandates for performance evaluation based on observations and student learning outcomes, colleges of Education across the state are working in partnership with our neighboring schools to ensure success for both veteran and novice teachers.

One exciting initiative that

shows great promise in national studies is a collaborative approach to the student teaching experience. Rather than observing first and gradually assuming full responsibility for the class as in the traditional approach to most student teaching experiences, the collaborative approach fosters team teaching between the mentor (cooperating) teacher and the student teacher from the first through the last day of the experience.

Stockton will be piloting this model in 2013-14, offering a tuition-free one-credit graduate course for mentor teachers this fall, and a two-credit tuition-free course in spring for mentors who teach collaboratively with a Stockton candidate.


