Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers

Pilot Testing PARCC in NJ: A total of <u>1,276 schools</u> (approximately 58 percent of all schools with tested grade levels) in 445 of New Jersey's 637 "local education agencies," which includes school districts and charter schools, will take part in field testing of the new PARCC student assessments. Typically, the field tests will be done in one or two classrooms in each participating school. Students participating in the PARCC field test will take only a portion of test so individual student or school reports will not be generated.

The field tests are an opportunity for districts to experience both the content of the new PARCC tests as well as the process for administering the computer-based assessments. There will be no consequences for students, teachers or schools associated with the field testing.

The coming field test of the PARCC assessments will occur in March and May, before the PARCC tests are implemented statewide in the spring of 2015. Preview samples at PARCC's practice test site.
