Welcome!

This is our first edition of the CrSLA Lab Newsletter!

CrSLA stands for the "Cross-Cultural Speech, Language, and Acoustics Lab" founded in September 2015 in the School of Health Sciences. It is the first independent faculty research lab, and is founded and directed by faculty Principal Investigator, Dr. Amee Shah, Associate Professor in Bachelors of Health Sciences (BSHS) program. Twenty-three students worked with Dr. Shah this semester in various roles of research, set-up of the lab, outreach, technical learning, and administrative tasks.

We are very excited to share with you our results and accomplishments of this lab and our research group through this *newsletter*. Our first edition is the launch edition and will span the whole Fall 2015 semester, however in the future, you can expect to see quarterly editions starting January 2016.

Here are some *highlights and historical landmarks*—hope you are as excited as we are!

Lab Space identified and re-configured: Summer 2015

Thanks to Dean Dr. Bartalotta's foresight and lobbying with the university, we got our lab space housed within the School of Health Science's building (West Quad)! This is a crucial milestone as it will help future interdisciplinary collaborations across the various programs of Health. The lab space was modified from a previous conference room and reconfigured with acoustic treatment needed to meet the specifications of this Speech acoustics lab, where high-fidelity speech recordings, as well as speech perception studies will be conducted.

Naming of the Lab: September 2015

The lab was named "Cross-Cultural Speech, Language, and Acoustics Lab", with an acronym CrSLA, and pronounced "kris-la" for short. The name was selected in consultation with the Dean to meet the vision and mission of the School of Health Sciences, as well as the teaching, research, and service goals of faculty Principal Investigator, Dr. Shah.

Vision & Mission of the Lab articulated: September 2015

Basic Description:

The CrSLA team conducts research on basic and applied speech and hearing issues, focusing on cultural competency, accents, and dialects. Research projects involve cross-language issues in speech production and perception, with a current emphasis on foreign-accentedness.

Mission Statement:

- This lab is a space for conducting research, as well as serving as a space of engagement for faculty, students, and clinicians interested in cross-cultural aspects of spoken communication.
- We specialize in the study, measurement, and management of dialect and accent variations.
- We are committed to helping reduce bias and breakdown in communication across cultural and linguistic differences through our research, education, and training.
- Our methods include speech-science based techniques of acoustic analysis, speech editing, audio and video interview, and ethnographic surveys.
- We also focus on social and clinical applications of our findings in community outreach, and developing industrybased programs for diversity management.

Research Interns interviewed and selected: September 2015

35 undergraduate students applied for the various research volunteer positions in the lab. After a process of individual interviews by Dr. Shah, a final pool of 23 students were selected as a match of their skills, interests, and position requirements. These students worked in various capacities including research assistants, assistant lab managers, clinical research assistants, research ambassadors, and project-based research assistants (their profiles are featured in the "People" page on the <u>CrSLA website</u>).

From some of their reflections, it appears that this research group greatly enjoyed this unique learning experience:

"So far, this opportunity has strengthened my confidence and skills in being a leader. I believe this opportunity will continue to strengthen my leadership skills, but also strengthen my skills in being a future clinician and researcher. With the help of Dr. Amee Shah, learning these skills, while participating in the research group, will help me beyond just learning in the classroom."

Lab Space furnished & equipped: Completed December 2015

Two work-stations, a central conference/meeting table, an equipment gallery, and a laptop/projector teaching set-up were equipped with furniture. All data storage cabinets and shelving were procured and installments were completed. Various research equipment and software were purchased, computer desktops and laptops were installed, defragged, and configured. Filing and organization of all datasets were completed. Locks and room access for all the student assistants, door signage, wall posters, and other enhancements were completed.

Pilot Research projects started: September-December 2015

- CAAI Clinical Outreach began; 365 universities reached.
- Doctors Without Accent Borders Patient documentary completed; portions presented at ASAHP.
- Cultural Competence Quotient (CCQ) Survey tool—Online Version completed and available for further research and education.

Abstracts and updates on these studies will be featured in the next issue of this newsletter.

Velocity Activators Research Group formed: October 2015 (officially named in December)

A research group, primarily for undergraduate students, is formed for students working in the CrSLA lab. The purpose is to develop a research culture and provide a well-rounded education to future clinicians in healthcare.

Students will be exposed to the behind-the-scenes activities in R&D. Moreover, they will have an active role in developing



the research as well as disseminating it in significant ways that improve the community.

Founding members 24 (23 undergraduate students, 1 graduate student, and 1 faculty advisor); 19 of these students will continue in Spring 2016, of which 7 will also be conducting independent study projects. Weekly research meetings on Fridays in WQ 216 or 210 (dates and times TBA for Spring 2016).

Meetings will address the following:

- Student research updates and brainstorming on issues.
- Student mock presentations for conferences and feedback.
- Invited guest presentation/discussion to foster interdisciplinary collaboration and expose students to a variety of research on campus and elsewhere.

Independent Studies: Fall 2015-Summer 2016

Seven undergraduate students have signed up to undertake Independent Studies (up to 3 credits each), to be completed through Spring 2016 under the direction of faculty mentor, Dr. Amee Shah. These students volunteered their time to set up feasibility pilots in December 2015 and after completion of the studies, will be presenting their research in the Open House and Day of Scholarships as mentioned below.


Lab Open House: TBA (Late Spring 2016)


