Galloway, NJ – Stockton University will host a lecture and panel addressing world population, poverty and hunger on **Tuesday, Nov. 17** from 4:30 - 6 p.m. in the Campus Center Theatre as part of International Education Week. The event, sponsored by the Stockton Office of Global Engagement in collaboration with the Stockton Center on Successful Aging, is free and open to the public.

The lecture by Kwan S. Kim, Ph.D., will review the magnitude of global poverty, and identify sources of vulnerability facing the poor before exploring local, national, and global actions needed to end extreme poverty and hunger in the context of social justice. Kim is Professor Emeritus of Economics; Fellow, Kellogg Institute for International Studies and Liu Institute for Asian Studies, all at the University of Notre Dame. His lecture is underwritten by Notre Dame's Alumni Association and South Jersey Club and honors the memory of Fr. Theodore Hesburgh, late emeritus president of Notre Dame.

Following Kim's lecture, Michael Rodriguez, Ph.D, associate professor of Political Science and director of Stockton's Washington Internship Program, will lead a panel discussion involving Kim, Scott Aughenbaugh, deputy director of Strategic Futures at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), and Eddie Wright, communications specialist for the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA).

Aughenbaugh specializes in global trend analysis and forecasting, which is used in CSIS's

flagship presentation, "Seven Revolutions: Scanning the Horizon Out to the Year 2035 and Beyond." Wright presents sessions about UNFPA's projects conducted in 140 countries and territories designed to enable and empower young people to grow up safely and pursue their own goals and aspirations.
