To build and maintain our community together and make our brother's and sister's problems our problems and to solve them together.



Uiamaa (Cooperative Economics)

To build and maintain our own stores, shops and other businesses and to

profit from them together.



Nia (Purpose)

To make our collective vocation the building and developing of our community in order to restore our people to their traditional greatness.



Kuumba (Creativity)

To do always as much as we can, in the way we can, in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it.



Imani (Faith)

To believe with all our heart in our people, our parents, our teachers, our leaders and the righteousness and victory of our struggle.

Featured performers will include Molefi Asante and the Afro-One dance troupe, featuring Dr. Patricia Reid-Merritt and Ms. Marjorie Barnes. The event will once again include performances of traditional African dance, poetry readings, music, an explanation of the history of Kwanzaa, food and much more. The cost of admission is \$5.00 for students and for group members of 10 individuals or more. The cost of admission for all other attendees is \$7.00 per person.
