Galloway Township, NJ- The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey has entered into a collaboration with the Noyes Museum of Art that will benefit students and enthusiasts of the arts, as well as the College, Museum and the entire southern New Jersey region.

"I am delighted Stockton has entered into a mutually beneficial agreement with the Noyes Museum that will provide enjoyment for the southern New Jersey arts community, increase opportunities for our students and expand programming at the Noyes," said Stockton President Herman J. Saatkamp, Jr. "The College has a history with the Noyes family going back to our earliest days. In 1975, honorary Stockton degrees were conferred upon Fred and Ethel Noyes. Over the years, the Noyes Museum has hosted numerous Stockton events, including our annual Alumni holiday reception. This partnership is a natural fit."

Stockton, which has a longstanding commitment to the arts and humanities, will partner with the Noyes Museum and will provide significant renovations and upgrades to support an expanded array of educational opportunities, events, exhibits and performances at the nearby off-campus facility. Stockton is also home to one of the area's top Performing Arts Center, and its own art gallery.

Charles A. Bryant, Jr., President of the Noyes Museum Board of Directors, said, "As the only art museum in South Jersey, this partnership with Stockton will enhance and deepen the community's connection with New Jersey arts and culture."

Stockton's Visual Arts program is growing and a new Bachelor of Fine Arts degree is currently under development. Such areas as Communications Studies, Historical Studies, Language and Culture Studies, Literature and Philosophy are examples of how Stockton is serving the Arts and Humanities in southern New Jersey. The partnership with the Noyes is a natural extension of Stockton's commitment to the area's cultural scene.
