







SoJourn, Summer 2018. This special expanded issue is thematic, presenting articles that describe the impact of the American Revolutionary War on South Jersey. Fourteen articles (compared with the usual eight to ten) make this 50% larger than our standard offering. Read about significant battles, such as the Battles of Turtle Gut Inlet in Cape May County, Redbank in Gloucester County, Iron Works Hill in Burlington County, and Chestnut Neck in Atlantic County. Enjoy the doggerel poem "The Battle of the Kegs," by Francis Hopkinson, signer of the Declaration of Independence. Learn about the recently refurbished Cedar Bridge Tavern and the Atlantic County Veterans Museum. Throughout, articles strive to make clear the desperate conditions of war visited on the eight southernmost counties of New Jersey, regardless of whether residents were loyal to the British crown, fighting for independence, or were pacifists. \$15.00

By Moses Klein and others. In 1889, Moses Klein published *Migdal Zophim*, a collection of essays that offers farming—in both Palestine and New Jersey—as a solution to the crisis of Jews fleeing Eastern European persecution. This republication supplements Klein's historical work with twenty additional accounts of the New Jersey farming colonies of Alliance, Rosenhayn and Carmel, dating from 1882 to 1907. Twenty original photographs have been reproduced along with twenty-three additional photographs not printed in the first edition. 

By Kenneth Tompkins & Robert Gregg. Here are 44 essays that chronicle the writing of *Reaching 40* (2011), a history of Stockton University. The essays were triggered by an issue, a problem, or an incorrect assumption in telling the history of the University. The essays, ten years after the publication of *Reaching 40*, still seem significant in that they provide insights into how the authors thought about the history of the College, the personalities who taught there, the issues they faced or ignored, the changes that were made, and the insistence that the unique qualities of the institution deserved preservation. 226 pages, paperback. Early Recollections and Life of Dr. James Still by James Still


During the nineteenth century, James Still was a gifted physician in South Jersey. An African American son of former slaves, who received scant traditional schooling, he was self taught in both medical knowledge and practice. Born in Washington Township, Burlington County, (now Shamong), Dr. Still overcame poverty and racial animus to build a large medical practice and become one of the wealthiest men in South Jersey. This republication of his outstanding autobiography, self-published in 1877, is a stirring reminder of the power of self-determination and faith.

William Still: His Life and Work to This Time by James P. Boyd

William Still, James' younger brother, was known as the Father of the Underground Railroad for his efforts in helping to move fugitive enslaved Africans while recording their harrowing stories. This title republishes James P. Boyd's 1886 biography of William and includes excerpts from William's *The Underground Rail Road*, first published in 1872.




HERBERT PAYNE: LAST OF THE OLD-TIME CHARCOAL MAKERS AND HIS COALING PROCESS



THE OUTFIT




by Budd Wilson



EVERYDAY ADVENTURES

A collection of twelve essays that describe Samuel Scoville Jr.'s jaunts into nature with arresting detail. Readers are introduced to hibernating mammals, snakes, orchids, and other flora, but especially to birds. Whether listening to birdsong, searching for hidden nests (which remain undisturbed), or quietly observing avian daily routines, Scoville describes his surroundings vividly, and often with considerable wit. He recounts expeditions in Connecticut, the Berkshires, Pennsylvania, Delaware, the Pine Barrens, and the far north of Canada. Quickly, readers find that they have stepped into the stories for everyday adventures of their own.

THE OUT OF DOORS CLUB




by Samuel Scoville Jr.




Burlington Biographies: A History of Burlington, New Jersey, Told Through the Lives of Its People



PINE BARRENS: LIFE AND LEGENDS




ATLANTIC CITY: ITS EARLY & MODERN HISTORY
