
An Introduction to the Curriculum at Stockton University

Stockton offers Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees. It takes 128 credits to earn a degree at Stockton. Some majors offer both the B.A. and the B.S. degrees. Many majors offer concentrations. For example, the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology offers a concentration in Forensic Psychology. The Bachelor of Science in Business offers concentrations in accounting, marketing, management, finance, and financial planning. The first chart below represents an overview of the parts of the curriculum for freshmen and freshmen and sophomore transfers. The curriculum is made up of Program, Cognate, General Studies and At-Some-Distance courses.


Freshmen or transfer students with fewer than 64 credits must complete the 128 credits in the following array:





A transfer student with 64 credits coming into Stockton would complete 128 credits in the following array:






It will be important for you to learn the curriculum. You will have a preceptor (advisor) assigned to you after you register to help clarify the curriculum, your major, and other educational goals. However, as stated in the university bulletin, you as the student are responsible for meeting your graduation requirements.


Stockton Terminology: Program and Cognate Courses

You can think of Program courses as courses in your major. If you are a psychology major, your Program courses are PSYC courses. If you are a biology major, your Program courses are BIOL courses. Program courses give depth of study in a major subject. Cognate courses can be thought of as *electives* in the major that are closely related to program courses in the major.

Program and Cognate courses make up half of the total credits for the B.A. degree:



For the B.S. degree, almost two-thirds of the degree is devoted to in-depth study in the major and closely related subjects:




General Studies Requirements

Twenty-five percent of the courses a student takes at Stockton must be in Stockton's General Studies courses. As you can see from the pie chart above, a freshman student will complete 32 credits in this area. Our General Studies courses at Stockton are unique to Stockton and offer many opportunities to explore areas unrelated to your major. General Studies courses are often part of minors at Stockton and can be fascinating courses as you plan your education.

For first-year students and transfer students with less than 64 credits:





Our General Studies courses have distinctive acronyms. Your CAPP degree evaluation will outline the 32 credits that you will need to complete the General Studies requirements. However, you should become familiar with the needed courses and acronyms:

If you have transfer credits, some of these may be allocated as General Studies courses:


- 1-15 transfer credits: no General Studies equivalencies awarded
- 16-31 transfer credits: up to 1 General Studies equivalency awarded
- 32-47 transfer credits: up to 2 General Studies equivalencies awarded
- 48-59 transfer credits: up to 3 General Studies equivalencies awarded.
- 60 or more transfer credits: no equivalencies granted.


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For all freshmen and transfer students: Your CAPP online degree evaluation will calculate which general studies will have to be completed at Stockton.

If you are a junior transferring from a community college with an associate's degree, your General Studies requirement will be *only 4 courses/16 credits*. This is represented in the next set of charts. You must take one GIS course, but the other three can be from any of the other "G" categories. *CAPP will compute and explain this requirement for you.*

For students with 64 transfer credits: Bachelor of Arts / Bachelor of Science.







At Some Distance Electives

At-Some Distance electives are not free, unrestrictive electives. They are defined as a category only when the student chooses a major program of study. The At-Some-Distance electives provide a breadth of study in courses that are in some way unrelated to the students' major program. For example, a sociology course would be considered At-Some-Distance for a chemistry major, but as a cognate for a psychology major.

For first-year students and transfers with less than 64 credits, the At-Some-Distance electives constitute one-quarter of the degree for a Bachelor of Arts, and one-eighth of the Bachelor of Science degree:





For students with 64 transfer credits, the At-Some-Distance electives increase by 16 credits, and the General Studies category shrinks by 16 credits. This makes the Stockton curriculum very receptive to transfer credits:





FOR ALL STUDENTS: All students must complete, either at Stockton or in transfer:

- The General Education Outcomes Requirement (A, H, V, I)
- 2. The Writing Requirement
- 3. The Quantitative Reasoning Requirement
- 1. The General Education Outcomes Requirement: All students must take one course in each of four areas: Arts (A), Historical Consciousness (H), Values/Ethics (V), and International/Multicultural (I). If a student has already earned a bachelor's degree, the student is exempt from this requirement. For transfer students, one or more of these courses may have already been taken in transfer. The attributes of "A," "H," "V," and "I" are attached to the courses in the registration screen and will show on a separate area of the CAPP degree evaluation once registered for or completed at Stockton or in transfer.
- 2. The Writing Requirement: At Stockton we believe that writing is an extremely important skill regardless of one's major or career goals. There are two main types of writing courses:
 - Writing Intensive courses (W1) focus on improving students' writing as their primary goal and basis for evaluation. Students may transfer up to two (2) W1 courses to Stockton.
 - Writing across the curriculum courses (W2) focus on a topic within a degree program or General Studies courses and use writing as an important means of learning and evaluation.

In order to graduate all students must complete:

At least <u>four</u> W1 or W2 courses with grades of <u>C</u> or better. One W1 course must be completed the freshman year. At least one W1 or W2 course must be numbered 3000 or higher. CAPP will keep track of your writing progress in a separate area.

W1 and W2 courses are counted as part of a student's overall curriculum and do not necessarily require any credits beyond the 128 to graduate.

- 3. The Quantitative Reasoning Requirement: Quantitative and mathematical skills are also important in virtually any career as well as in everyday life. Stockton seeks to assure that all students enhance these skills through two types of courses:
 - Quantitative reasoning intensive courses (Q1) focus primarily on mathematical thinking; developing students' quantitative skills is the primary goal.
 - Quantitative reasoning across the curriculum courses (Q2) focus on a topic or subject area
 outside of mathematics. Quantitative or mathematical thinking is used as an important means
 of learning that subject area.

In order to graduate all students must complete with a D- or higher:

At least three Q courses: 1 Q1 course (freshmen must take their first year), 1 Q2 course, and a third Q1 or Q2 course.

You will be assigned an advisor or "preceptor" soon after you register. The name of that person will be on your Student Services page of the go.stockton portal. It is important that you visit your preceptor on advising days and beyond to make sure you are on track with your curriculum choices. Your preceptor can help with questions about graduate school, careers, and other academic concerns. If you change your major, you will need to change your preceptor as well. 

CHOOSE FROM ONE OF THE THREE STUDY ABROAD OPTIONS

1. SEMESTER STUDY ABROAD

a. Third-Party Provider Programs

Students pay <u>tuition</u>, <u>fees and housing costs to the Provider</u>.

Third-party providers are **independent companies** with whom Stockton University is affiliated. These companies create a study abroad program for students, by partnering with universities in foreign countries and contracting housing abroad. The **Provider issues guidance on visa acquisition**, delivers **on-site orientation and services**, and **offers excursions**. Therefore, **students studying abroad with a Provider become the Provider's student**, not a foreign university's student.

Provider programs are a good choice for students who are used to high level of student services and wish to have more hands-on guidance before and during their international experience.

b. Academic Exchange Programs

Students pay tuition and fees to Stockton, and housing and meals on arrival. These programs are typically **more affordable** than third party provider programs.

Exchange programs are study abroad options based on an exchange agreement between Stockton University and a foreign institution. Here, students direct enroll into the foreign university and become their international exchange student.

Some of the Academic Exchange Programs are: CQUniversity (Australia); La Rochelle Business School (France); National Chiayi University (Taiwan); Rikkyo University (Japan); Universidad del Rosario (Colombia); American College of Greece (Greece); and many more on OGE Global Partnership webpage.

2. FACULTY LED PROGRAMS (FLP)

FLPs are Stockton University courses which include a mandatory short-term period of study abroad, usually 9 days to two weeks, led by the course instructor. The **trip abroad may occur during winter break**, **spring break or at the end of the spring term**. The **tuition** for these courses is **included in flat rate tuition**. The **abroad component** is organized by Stockton University, and **is paid for separately**, with **students making deposits** to the University. It typically covers <u>round trip airfare</u>, <u>accommodations</u>, <u>excursions</u>, <u>local travel</u>, <u>some food and much more</u>. Abroad program fees vary from \$2,500 to \$4,600, depending on the destination and local cost of living.

We offer different FLPs every semester because faculty do not lead the same programs every year. The **enrollment qualification** is based on an **in-person interview and evaluation prior to course enrollment.**Stockton offers FLP to Brazil, Colombia, Dominica, Ecuador, Guatemala, Greece, Italy, Japan, Senegal, South Africa, Spain, Taiwan, ...and many other wonderful programs.

3. PROGRAM PETITION

Students who seek a very specific opportunity not otherwise available via the approved modes of study abroad, have an option to petition the University for permission to earn academic credit via an unapproved program provider (stand-alone university, or third-party organization).

Stockton University reviews and approves programs based on standards of good practice in the field of study abroad, with the aid of the Study Abroad Committee.

Teacher Education for Prospective Stockton Students



ur School of Education prepares new P-12 teachers for initial certification. Our TEAC-accredited program includes multiple pre-service fieldwork experiences before the 15-week student teaching experience, placing it among the highest in New Jersey for both, intensity and diversity.

Stockton students interested in becoming teachers are encouraged to major in an academic subject area typically taught in public schools: Biology, Chemistry, History, Literature, Math, Psychology or Sociology. However, any liberal arts baccalaureate degree can lead to certification (see reverse for certification options). Many majors now offer a concentration in education so that certification is embedded within their 4-year program.

The School of Education offers Freshman and Transfer seminars designed specifically for future teachers. Our classes are held in state-of-the-art classrooms for hands-on technology integration. Students are guided through the Charlotte Danielson Framework of Teaching, a New Jersey endorsed model of teacher performance evaluation.

The first step for all prospective Stockton students seeking teacher certification is to apply to the University and indicate which level. For information about which level (P-3, K-6 Elementary, or K-12 Secondary) applicants should contact the School of Education at the addresses and numbers shown below. Students will receive information, guidance, and certification advice, including requirements, policies, and procedures of the Program.

The School of Education also provides assistance for students in meeting New Jersey state eligibility requirements in addition to course work that includes a Criminal History check with appropriate immunizations, a health and hygiene test as well as Reading, Writing and Math scores on SAT, ACT or Praxis Core proficiency exams:

Beyond initial certification, the School also offers a complete set of additional endorsements and graduate degrees with many specialization areas (see reverse).

Office of Service-Learning

The Office of Service-Learning provides students with opportunities to engage with the community in stimulating and fulfilling ways that will enhance their academic experience. They take advantage of the many personal and professional growth possibilities that enlighten them to perform to their full potential as members of the Stockton community and the global community through community-based learning. Volunteer opportunities are abundant through New Student Day of Service at the start of the fall semester, Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service in January, and a variety of short or long-term community volunteer opportunities in courses and outside of classrooms.

The Office of Service-Learning offers students the opportunity to work with local nonprofits, social service organizations and schools as part of specific academic courses. Through service-learning, the students use new knowledge and skills to help solve pressing social issues faced by the local community while using the volunteer experience to enhance their grasp of the course material. Students interested in service-learning opportunities should contact the Office of Service-Learning or speak to their preceptor.

Benefits of Service-Learning

Students who complete a service-learning project gain powerful tools to add to their supply of skills as students and citizens. Students will...

- Learn from experience
- Gain personal and interpersonal skills
- Develop social problem solving skills
- Learn civic innovation and responsibility
- Form relationships with potential employers, receive recommendations for jobs, and gain experience that will add to a resume or portfolio
- Learn outside the classroom
- Become more actively involved in the community
- Sharpen critical thinking skills through examining social/current issues

Service-Learning Student Standards

- Reliability: Scheduling commitment must be fully honored
 - o Fully participate for the minimum number of hours committed
 - Record your hours
 - Emergencies that prevent you from meeting your commitment require a phone call to your site supervisor

- **Professionalism:** Staff at the community agency will be your guide in developing a professional approach to working with the community and addressing its individual needs
 - Follow the community partners' policies and procedures. If you have any problems, report them to your site supervisor as soon as possible.
 - You should abide by the community partner's dress policy for professional staff
- Confidentiality: In many fields, information about community members or partners is covered
 by strict rules of confidentiality. Your site supervisors know how your service might be affected
 by obligations of confidentiality, and you may be asked to submit a signed confidentiality
 agreement
- **Sensitivity:** When you are in the community, be aware of situations and experiences that may affect your own safety. Ask your site supervisors to give you instructions and then take the steps to safeguard yourself
- **Service-Related Injuries and Illnesses:** Every service-learning student should sign a release of liability as part of the initial orientation. Make sure before beginning your assignment that you are covered by independent health insurance
- Education: To ensure the complete holistic experience, please refer to our Reflection and Dialogue sessions offered every semester

Office of Service-Learning Leadership Opportunities

Bonner Leaders are civically engaged and community focused student leaders at Stockton. They receive a stipend for serving 8-10 hours per week, often as part of Federal Work Study funds. They focus on specific issue areas, such as hunger and homelessness, literacy and learning, environmental justice, political engagement, or health and wellness. They often partner with a community organization that is also focused on these issues, serving at that location for some of their weekly hours. They consider on and off campus solutions to the issue in which they are most interested, and organize students through service-learning classes, clubs and organizations to be part of the solution. Bonner Leaders are part of a national cohort of Bonner Leaders and Scholars, supported through The Bonner Foundation, based in Princeton, NJ. There is an application process to become a Bonner Leader, and any Stockton student interested in social justice and becoming an agent of change is welcome to apply.

Changebuilders are Stockton University students invested in service in their local community and committed to enhancing their academic learning with hands-on experience with local organizations working on deeply rooted struggles. For example, a Stockton Changebuilder who is an education major will commit to working in a local afterschool program 8-10 hours per week to gain real world experience and connect to being part of the solution. Organized through the Office of Service-Learning, Changebuilders are motivated to serve for many different reasons. Support, facilitated reflection, and training are all part of the wraparound guidance that the Office of Service-Learning provides to Change builders.



IMPORTANT REMINDER

NEW JERSEY STATE STATUTE IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS MEASLES, MUMPS, RUBELLA, HEPATITIS B & MENINGITIS

All new or continuing undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in a program of study leading to an academic degree at any 4-year public or independent institution of higher education in NJ are required to provide evidence of immunization as a prerequisite to enrollment as follows:

Measles: Two doses of live measles virus vaccine (at least 30 days apart), or any vaccine combination containing live measles virus vaccine on or after the student's first birthday.

Mumps: One dose of live mumps virus vaccine, or any vaccine combination containing live mumps virus vaccine on or after the student's first birthday.

Rubella: One dose of live rubella virus vaccine, or any vaccine combination containing live rubella virus vaccine on or after the student's first birthday.

Hepatitis B: Three dose series of Hepatitis B vaccine, or two dose adolescent series (Recombivax only) vaccination given between the ages of 11 and 15.

Documented laboratory evidence of immunity to Measles, Mumps, and Rubella or Hepatitis B may be submitted in place of above vaccines, a copy of actual laboratory results must be sent with the completed forms.

Residential Students:

Meningitis: One dose of meningococcal vaccine for all students residing in campus residence halls, as a condition of attendance.

Meningococcal disease is a potentially fatal bacterial infection commonly referred to as meningitis. Cases of meningitis among teens and young adults 15 to 24 years of age have more than doubled since 1991. The disease strikes about 3,000 Americans each year and claims about 300 lives. Between 100 and 125 meningitis cases occur on university campuses and as many as 15 students will die from the disease.

A vaccine is available that protects against four types of the bacteria that cause meningitis in the United States – types A, C, Y and W-135. These types account for nearly two thirds of the meningitis cases among university students.

All students at Stockton University must meet state requirements regarding immunizations. Prior to registration all students are required to submit immunization records.

Deadline for Fall Entry

Deadline for Spring Entry

Due two weeks after enrollment and/or housing deposit submission

Exemptions to the Immunization Requirements:

- 1. Students age 31 or older
- Certain medical conditions in which immunizations pose a health risk. Individuals in need of a medical exemption for immunizations must submit a written statement from their healthcare provider that immunization is contraindicated due to a valid medical condition.
- Clearly proscribed and documented religious exclusions.
 If the student chooses to request a religious exemption to immunizations, a letter must be submitted from the enrolled student stating specific religious doctrine that prohibits immunization. Letters from parents or religious leaders will not be accepted.

All residential students regardless of age are required to show proof of meningitis. Should an infectious disease outbreak occur, the University may require students without documented evidence of immunity to stay away from the campus until the outbreak is over and students are cleared to return.

Forms signed by students or parent/guardian will not be accepted. All forms must be mailed to the address listed below or faxed to 609.626.5586 prior to deadline. Your student Z# should be included on these forms. Do not submit documentation to any other department. Immunization documentation from a high school or other college/university will be accepted in place of the forms below. Copies of original immunization records from health departments or other countries will also be accepted. Please do not send originals. They will not be returned! Satisfactory Academic Progress

To receive federal or state financial aid, students must demonstrate satisfactory academic progress toward the attainment of a degree. Stockton University will evaluate Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) for all financial aid recipients annually at the close of the Spring semester. The annual evaluation will take place in May of each year. It will include all prior terms of attendance, including transfer credits. Accordingly, the following minimum academic standard has been adopted to ensure that students are aware of the requirements that must be met in order to remain eligible for federal and state financial aid resources.

The SAP Evaluation

Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) is evaluated for federal and state financial aid recipients annually at the close of the Spring semester. Please note: Once an undergraduate student has attempted more than 20 Stockton credits in their degree program, they will be included in the SAP evaluation. Graduate students begin their SAP evaluation the first semester of attendance. Students identified as not making progress (SAP) will receive correspondence at their campus e-mail address.

The SAP determination

There are three measurement components in the evaluation to meeting the SAP standards. **Qualitative measurement** (cumulative GPA), **Quantitative measurement** (credit completion pace) and **Maximum timeframe** (attempted credits do not exceed 150% of program length)

Students who have not met one or more of the above SAP measurement components should take every opportunity to regain their status by enrolling for summer classes.

Students who have been notified that they are "NOT MAINTAINING SAP" and are eligible to file a SAP appeal can do so if they have extenuating circumstances. Satisfactory Academic Progress appeals are only approved once. If an appeal is denied, the student can pay for his educational expenses from an alternative loan or his own resources. At the next SAP annual review any student who has been denied SAP and has attended classes will be re-evaluated for financial aid eligibility reinstatement.

Appeal forms will not be processed if you have been dismissed from the college. If you have been reinstated to the college, your SAP appeal form must have been submitted to the financial aid office by the July 15th deadline before your semester of reinstatement.

Students who do not maintain SAP will receive an e-mail of their evaluation results. All students can find their Satisfactory Academic Progress results on Stockton's *Go* Portal.

Quantitative Measure

To maintain Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP), the annual pace a student must complete their program of study is **67%** of their cumulative attempted credits (includes transfer credits). The percentage completion pace is determined by taking the program length and divided by the maximum timeframe. To calculate an undergraduate program pace, take the program length, 4 years or 128 credits divided by the maximum timeframe, 6 years or 192 credits. This equals to an annual **67%** completion pace. The student would need to complete the program after attempting 192 credits. To calculate a Graduate Studies program the annual pace is determined by taking the program length of 2 years or 36 credits is divided by the maximum timeframe 3 years or 54 credits. The annual completion pace for Graduate Studies is **67%** of their cumulative attempted credits. The student will need to complete the program after attempting 54 credits.

Stockton has developed a Satisfactory Academic Progress Calculator to calculate your credit completion pace to assist you in developing a plan to maintain/regain your SAP standing. Click here to access the SAP credit completion pace calculator.

Qualitative Measure

All undergraduate students are required to earn a cumulative 2.0 GPA at the time of the annual SAP evaluation at the close of the spring semester. All graduate students are required to earn a cumulative 3.0 GPA

Maximum Time frame

The maximum time frame allowed to receive financial aid in an Undergraduate or Graduate program cannot exceed 150% of the credits required to complete the specific program of study. Please note: Transfer credits accepted by Stockton will also be counted in this determination.

Undergraduate Full, Part-time and EOF students	Students must complete their program within 150 % of the program length Program length=128 credits x 150% maximum time frame= 192 credits	Students who exceed 192 attempted credits will be deemed "NOT MAKING SAP". There is no option to appeal this decision.
Graduate Students	Students must complete their program within 150% of the program length. Program length=36 credits x 150% maximum time frame= 54 credits	Students who exceed 54 attempted credits will be deemed "NOT MAKING SAP". There is no option to appeal this decision.

- All semesters of attendance in addition to accepted transfer credits are included in the satisfactory academic progress
 evaluation. The evaluation will include semesters of enrollment such as matriculated and/or non-matriculated, part time and/or
 full time semesters in which a student did not receive financial aid. Credits that were earned prior to the acceptance into the
 "New Start" program are also included in the evaluation.
- Students who change majors must recognize these time frames are respective to the credits earned to complete the new degree requirements.
- Once a student has completed all of the requirements for a first bachelor degree, the student ceases to be eligible for federal and state financial aid for that program.
- Students who have a previous "No SAP" evaluation will also be evaluated to determine if they have regained their eligibility to receive federal and state financial aid.
- Students who have been notified that they are "NOT MAINTAINING SAP" and are eligible to file a SAP appeal can do so if they have extenuating circumstances. This will be the **only** time that a student may appeal a SAP evaluation at Stockton. If the appeal is approved, the student will be placed on "Probation" for one semester and their progress will be evaluated after the probation semester to determine if they have met the requirement as outlined in the Academic Plan provided by Academic Advising.
- There are three measurement components in the evaluation to meeting the SAP standards to continue receiving financial assistance. Qualitative measurement (cumulative GPA), quantitative measurement (credit completion pace) and maximum timeframe (attempted credits do not exceed 150% of program length).

Please take note that the following may affect your Satisfactory Academic Progress evaluation.

- **Transfer and consortium credits** -Transfer and consortium credits accepted by Stockton will be counted in satisfactory academic progress evaluation.
- **Withdrawals** Satisfactory academic progress is measured by the number of earned credits, according to the standards. Therefore (W) grades are not considered earned and may affect satisfactory progress.
- Incompletes Grades of Incomplete (I) are not earned credits. Students have one term immediately following the term in which an (I) grade was received to complete the course [or an (I) will be considered to be an (F) grade]. Students, who receive an (I) grade in the spring term, should pursue a grade during the summer terms so that financial aid eligibility can be updated. It is the student's responsibility to notify the Financial Aid Office when the incomplete grade has been cleared.
- **Repeats** Repeated (R) courses will be counted as new courses for financial aid payment, however, please be advised that you may receive Financial Aid for a course that is repeated only once.
- **Second major and additional degrees -** students who change majors and pursue additional degrees must be aware that the SAP policy is respective to the timeframe to complete those requirements. Please know that you may exhaust your PELL grant eligibility timeframe along with exhausting your loan borrowing limits in doing so.
- Consortium Credits consortium credits will be excluded in the evaluation until such time that the transfer credits have been accepted by Stockton.
- **Pass** No credits Courses-Courses graded P (Pass) or NC (No Credit) will be recorded on the student's official transcript. Such courses will not be factored into calculation of the student's GPA but will be included in the credits attempted and earned.
- **Remedial coursework** remedial coursework will be included in all measurements of the SAP evaluation. Keep in mind that the additional remedial courses will impact your maximum timeframe requirement to meeting the SAP standards.

The SAP Appeal process

• Students who have been notified that they are "NOT MAINTAINING SAP" and are eligible to file a SAP appeal can do so if they have extenuating circumstances. This will be the **only** time that a student may appeal a SAP evaluation at Stockton. Students are encouraged to earn the deficit credits during the summer. Appeal forms will not be processed if you have been dismissed from the college.

The appeal submitted by the student will include the following.

Appeal Form

The appeal form will include a narrative of the (1) extenuating circumstances as to why the student failed to meet SAP standards and (2) and how the student plans to correct his/her SAP requirements at the next evaluation.

Documentation

It is advisable that students submit documentation to support their appeal. Make your case! Examples include: Newspaper obituaries or death certificates, physician's written statement to substantiate illness or accident, written statement from clergy, family member, or other third party who knows the student's situation, written statement from academic advisor or professor.

Steps to take to complete the SAP appeal process:

Step 1

• The student must complete and bring the SAP appeal form to the Academic Advising Office (CC-242). An advisor will help you in completing the academic plan. The Academic Plan must specify that the student must achieve the target "semester" 2.0 GPA and the earned credit requirement by the specified point in time. The plan will assist you in meeting your academic goal and to achieve the required SAP requirement by the end of the probation period.

Step 2

• If the Academic Plan demonstrates that you are able to regain SAP, you will then take the SAP appeal form and Academic Plan to Stockton's Student Success Services office (F-110). Student Success Services will then enroll you in the Student Success Services program to provide you with the guidance and programs that they offer for you to succeed at Stockton.

• The Academic Plan will use the following timeframes so that the student has the guidance to regain SAP prior to the following Fall semester by enrolling in classes during:

Summer (semester after the evaluation)
Fall (the probation period)
Spring
Summer

Please note: It is important that you call the Academic Advising office (609-652-4504) to make an appointment and schedule a Student Success Services appointment at this **website** to meet with them to complete your appeal process.

When the appeal is approved the student will be placed on "probation" and granted **one semester** of financial aid for the Fall semester. The student will be monitored at the end of the probation period (fall semester) to verify that they have met the requirements as outlined in the Academic Plan. If the student has met the academic plan requirements, the student will receive financial aid for the Spring semester. The student will again be monitored at the end of the Spring semester. The student will need to have met all SAP requirements at that time or enroll in Summer classes for the last effort to regain SAP. If the student fails to meet the SAP requirements, the student will no longer be able to receive financial aid until they have regained SAP paying for classes from an Alternative loan or their own resources.

The student who has used their one and only appeal option in a prior evaluation and is NOT MAINTAINING SAP may reestablish eligibility for the following academic year. To re-establish eligibility, the student must meet the SAP requirements as outlined in the SAP policy.

About Your ID Card

ADD FUNDS TO OSPREY CARD

Instead of carrying cash or credits cards, you may transfer (add) funds onto your Osprey Card from your goStockton account and then use the card to pay for meals or to make purchases on-campus or at participating off-campus locations (http://ospreycash.ugrydnetwork.com/index.cfm).

IMPORTANT: Before submitting the request, verify that there are funds available in your goStockton account that can be added (transferred) to your Osprey Card. You may transfer up to \$1500 to your Osprey Card each semester. Excess financial aid funds (after disbursement) may be transferred to your Osprey Card. If there are not sufficient funds in your account, you may need to Make a Payment before submitting the request.

Payments to your account can be made online (electronic check or credit card) from the Bursars/Payments tab in goStockton or in-person (cash or check) at the Bursar's Office (CC-202).

Students may submit the Add Funds to Osprey Card online from goStockton on the Bursars/Payments tab or in-person at the Bursar's Office (CC-202). Faculty and staff must submit the request in-person at the Bursars Office (CC-202).

Instructions for transferring 'Financial Aid' funds to your Osprey card:

- 1. From go.stockton.edu (/portal/login.html)
- 2. Sign in to the GO portal
- 3. Click on 'Bursars'
- 4. Click on My Account/My Bill
- 5. Choose the current term and click Submit
- 6. Scroll down to view your Account Balance as of Today*
- 7. Verify that there are sufficient funds available for transfer (Available funds will appear as a credit (a negative number). If there is a zero balance, you will need to make a payment before proceeding)
- 8. Go Back to the 'Bursars' area of the GO portal
- 9. Click on 'Add Funds to Osprey Card' (to the right of page)
- 10. Click on 'Submit Request'
- 11. Enter the amount you wish to transfer
- 12. Click Submit

Instructions for transferring a payment to your Osprey card:

- 1. From go.stockton.edu (/portal/login.html)
- 2. Sign in to the GO portal
- 3. Click on 'Bursars'
- 4. Click on 'Make a Payment' (in the middle of the page)

- 5. In the box at the right enter the amount you are adding to the Osprey card
- 6. Click 'Continue'
- 7. Select Payment method follow the prompts to complete the payment process
- 8. Return to the 'Bursars' area of the GO portal
- 9. Click on 'Add Funds to Osprey Card' (to the right of page)
- 10. Click on 'Submit Request'
- 11. Enter the amount you wish to transfer
- 12. Click Submit

When making the request, you will need to designate whether the funds can be used for Restricted or Unrestricted purchases.

RESTRICTED funds can only be used to purchase (or supplement a meal plan) at dining locations in the Campus Center, N-Wing, Lakeside and Atlantic City.

UNRESTRICTED funds can be used for purchases at all on-campus locations (restaurants, bookstores, box office, etc.) and participating off-campus locations. Financial Aid funds can ONLY be designated as Unrestricted.

Requests are processed daily. Requests submitted after business hours, on weekends or holidays will be processed the next business day. Cash cannot be withdrawn from the card and the funds cannot be removed once they have been transferred. Funds carry over semester to semester until the student graduates or leaves the university at which time a refund check will be issued.

GetFood

Your Osprey Card account is separate from your goStockton account and is managed through GetFood (http://get.cbord.com/stockton). You may view your Osprey Card balance, track spending and report lost or stolen cards through GetFood. First time users will need to create a GetFood (http://get.cbord.com/stockton) account.

Lost or Stolen Card

Lost or stolen ID cards must be reported through GetFood (http://get.cbord.com/stockton) and then to the Office of Student Records (CC-203) to obtain a new ID card. There is a \$25.00 fee for replace ID cards.

Information Technology Services

The *go*Stockton Portal provides students a personalized, single point of access to Stockton's online resources such as the academic calendar, course information, organized activities on campus, upcoming events, and campus news among many other services.

The first time you log in to the Portal, you'll learn about the standards that apply to the acceptable use of Stockton's computing and communication facilities. Additionally, you will be prompted to reset your password. Please visit https://stockton.edu/FirstLogin for instructions.

There are two options for connecting to the Stockton Campus Network, and they are listed below.

Important Note: Before you configure your devices, make sure you log in to the Portal first if you haven't done so to reset your default password (instructions on next page).

If using **Stockton-Wireless** (for guest access), upon opening your browser, you'll see a Stockton University Wireless Access notice. Read the "Acceptable Usage Standards of Computing and Communication Technology", then select I accept Stockton University's Acceptable Use Standards and click on Submit. The system will provide you with unlimited access to the Internet, and will keep your device connected for 12 hours. After that, it'll take you through the steps above to regain access to the Internet.

The recommended wireless connection is **Stockton-Secure-Wireless** to set up a permanent connection. Go to https://stockton.edu/wireless and select the instructions that match your device from the available connections. As you follow the instructions, you will need to use your Stockton username and password to authenticate.

Download the Mail App to your iPhone/iPad or Android device


Students at Stockton are automatically assigned an e-mail account shortly after acceptance. Student usernames are created using a combination of last name, first initial, and occasionally numeric digits as needed to make the username unique. The e-mail address format is username@go.stockton.edu.

Student e-mails are powered by Gmail, which is a web-based e-mail that merges the benefits of a Web browser with the global reach provided by the Internet's standards-based e-mail. What this means to you is easier access to your e-mail from any computer with access to the Internet. Additionally, Gmail, with Google Drive, provides students with unlimited storage space.


Your e-mail account is accessible through the goStockton Portal (look for the mail icon on the top right), and Gmail with Google Apps.




Stockton Online Computer Labs (VDI)

The academic computing facilities at Stockton are designed to provide students with the appropriate resources to support their educational experience. The labs are equipped with state-of-the-art equipment and provide a wide-range of software packages. Computer labs

Printing from our Computer Facilities

Students at Stockton University need to be aware of standards and practices related to the use of and printing from University computers in computer labs, gallery computers and the library. These computers require users to log in using their *goStockton* username and password. Each semester active students are allotted a print quota (see below) for black and white printing (Deposits for B&W printing are made at the beginning of the semester and are based on enrollment status.)

Undergraduate students: 1600 points Graduate students: 2000 points

1 point is utilized per printed side of a page. By default, Stockton printers are set to print on both sides of the paper. Usage example: A 5-page document would print on 3 pieces of paper (double sided) and charge the student 5 printer points.

- It is critical that students remember to log off any university computer when they have finished their session. Failure to do so could put the contents of their *My Documents* folder at risk, and may allow others to use their printing points.
- Students should consult with individual faculty members regarding faculty policies and preferences on printing of both course materials and assigned papers, both to get the most from their printing points and to comply with any faculty restrictions on submitting papers printed on both sides of a sheet of paper.
- Students who exhaust their printing points can visit https://ppoints.stockton.edu to perform a free one-time self-credit. Should a student subsequently use all of the additional printer points, they can contact the Help Desk to request more, provided they have a reasonable explanation as to why they need additional printing points.
- Students are allotted 1 Gigabyte of storage space for saving files in their Stockton University My
 Documents. This space is located in the My Documents folder, which is accessible on any
 University Lab Computer or via the Online Computer Labs (VDI). Students are advised to use this
 space to store documents instead of printing them.

Color Printing

There are three color printers available for students in D002, F210, on the main floor of the Library. Every student is granted a one-time allocation of 20 free color prints for use during their tenure as a Stockton student. Students can purchase more color points in blocks of **50 for \$5**. More information available at https://ppoints.stockton.edu.

Printing from your own Devices

Students can also use their printing points to print to selected Stockton printers from their own laptops or mobile devices. Please note that this service is only available on campus and supported printers are designated via an overhanging sign above the printer. Stockton GoPortal Password Strength Recommendations

- Do not create passwords based upon details that may not be as confidential as you'd expect. Your birth date, phone number, or names of family members are NOT safe password choices.
- Avoid using simple adjacent keyboard combinations. For example, "qwerty", "asdzxc" and "123456" are horrible passwords that are extremely easy to crack.
- Consider using a "pass phrase" rather than a password. A pass phrase can contain letters
 in the form of words, special characters, and numbers. For example:
 "Correct-horse-936."
- Never use the password you've created for your Stockton email account on another internet-based service. Keeping separate passwords protects your information if an online service gets compromised; i.e., you won't have to worry about attackers using the same information to access multiple accounts.

Information Security Account Protection Tips

- You can always check to see if your information has been compromised by visiting <u>haveibeenpwned.com</u>. This website has an easy search function to see if your email credentials have been leaked.
- If you receive ANY emails prompting you to log into your account for some reason (or providing a handy link to do so), STOP. It may be a phishing attempt. Visit the site directly in a new browser window to ensure that you're logging into the correct web page.
- Avoid password re-use at all cost. If a password is shared across multiple platforms and a single one gets compromised, an attacker can use that information to access your accounts while making it nearly impossible to retrieve them.

Tips for Traveling & Secure Technology Usage

Introduction

Hackers target travelers because many do not know how to keep their data secure on-the-go. When traveling, here are a few tips on keeping your accounts and personal information secure.

• Mobile Hotspot: Many phone carriers allow users to use their phone as an internet hotspot. Although we would not suggest using this method for banking or other important tasks requiring severely personal information, enabling WPA2 encryption on your hotspot as well as creating a strong wireless network password will allow you to surf the web more securely, essentially using your mobile data instead of public Wi-fi. Be sure to enable encryption and password protection; without it, this option is nearly as vulnerable as just using public Wi-fi.

- Phone Data vs. Wi-fi: Cellular data is encrypted by default and is relatively safe to use for browsing the web. Again, we would not suggest using this method for banking or other important tasks requiring severely personal information, but if the other two options are not available for some reason or another, using your phone to surf the web using cellular data only is better than nothing. Prior to traveling, go into your phone settings and disable Wi-fi connectivity for the duration of your trip.
- Keep your devices with you at all times. You may think leaving your devices in your car or hotel
 room while out and about will keep them secure, but devices (and consequently, traveler's
 identities) are stolen quite frequently. If you cannot feasibly bring your device with you on-thego, and you absolutely cannot leave them at home, ask in advance if your hotel provides rooms
 with a personal safe for valuables.



FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT STUDENT NOTIFICATION

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) of 1974 is a Federal law that is administered by the Family Policy Compliance Office in the U.S. Department of Education (DOE) and protects the privacy of student education records. FERPA applies to all educational agencies and institutions that receive funding under any program administered by the DOE.

When a student reaches 18 years of age or attends a postsecondary institution, he or she becomes an "eligible student" under FERPA and all rights formerly given to parents transfer to the student.

FERPA requires institutions to notify students annually of their rights under the Act. Stockton posts this information in goStockton on the Student Services tab. Your rights to access your education records are summarized below:

Access to Records:

You have the right to inspect and review your educational records within 45 days following receipt of a request for access. To access your records, proper identification is required as well as reasonable allowances for time, place and supervision.

Amendment of Records:

You have the right to request that inaccurate or misleading information in your education records be amended. To request an amendment to your records, you will need to submit a statement in writing to the college official responsible for the record. Clearly identify the inaccuracy or misleading information and your reason(s) about why you believe the information is inaccurate or misleading. You may view the college officials responsible for your record from the Registrar's Home page under FERPA.

Disclosure Records:

As noted above, once a student reaches 18 years of age or attends a postsecondary institution, he or she becomes an "eligible student," and all rights formerly given to parents under FERPA transfer to the student.

Stockton does not release any information (except that which is permitted under the FERPA regulations) without the student's written consent. This includes your parent(s). To give Stockton permission to allow your parent(s) or other named third party to access your records, you will complete and submit the Release Records to Parent or Other Third Party form to the Registrar's Office.

It should also be noted that, under FERPA, institutions may release information to parents without the consent of the student if the student is a dependent for tax purposes under the IRS rules. The parent will need to submit a copy of his/her most recent federal tax records to the Office of the Registrar.

FERPA regulations allow institutions to disclose information to "school officials" that have been determined by the institution to have a "legitimate educational interest." Stockton defines "school officials" as a person employed by the College in an administrative, supervisory, academic, or support staff position.

FERPA regulations also permit the disclosure of "directory information" to non-institutional persons/organizations outside of the college without the student's written consent.

The college may release any of these items without written consent from the student. To prevent your "directory information" from being released, you will need complete and submit the <u>Prevent Disclosure of Directory Information</u> form to the Registrar's Office before the end of the drop/add period noted on the academic calendar.

File a Complaint:

You have the right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education if you believe the college has failed to comply with the requirements of FERPA.

WHAT'S WITH THE GREEN DOT?

Visualize for a moment that unforgettable image of small red-dots spreading across a computer generated map of

the US, symbolizing the spread of some terrible epidemic — with each tiny red dot representing an individual case. With disturbing speed, the three or four single dots multiply and spread until the whole map emits a red glow comprised of a zillion tiny dots.

NOW IMAGINE FOR A MOMENT A MAP OF OUR CAMPUS. Each red dot

on this map represents an act of power-based personal violence (partner violence, sexual violence, or stalking) – or a choice to tolerate, justify or perpetuate this violence. A red dot is a rape – a red dot is a hit – a red dot is a threat – a red dot is a statement that justifies or minimizes the violence – a red dot is an individual choice to do nothing in the face of a high risk situation. Power-based personal violence is not a huge, solid mass that can simply be

removed with one swift action or policy. Rather, it is the accumulation of individual decisions, moments, values, and actions made by the men and women from every corner of our campus, it's hard to know exactly how many red dots are on our map at any given moment – but we do know there have been enough red dots to create a culture that sustains far too many women and men experiencing violence.

NOW IMAGINE ADDING A GREEN DOT IN THE MIDDLE OF ALL THOSE RED DOTS ON OUR MAP. Imagine that a green dot is any behavior, choice, word, or attitude that promotes safety for all of us and communicates utter intolerance for any form of violence. A green dot is pulling a friend out of a high risk situation — a green dot is putting a green dot statement on your Facebook page — a green.

situation – a green dot is putting a green dot statement on your Facebook page – a green dot doing a paper about violence prevention – a green dot is hanging an awareness poster in your hall or classroom– a green dot is wearing your green dot gear – a green dot is

encouraging discussion in class about violence prevention – a green dot is striking up a conversation with a friend about how much this issue matters to you – a green dot is organizing a fundraiser for campus prevention efforts

- a green dot is getting your organization to go to green dot bystander training. A green dot is simply your individual choice at any given moment to make our campus safer.



HOW MANY GREEN DOTS WILL IT TAKE TO BEGIN REDUCING POWER-BASED PERSONAL VIOLENCE?

How many green dots will it take to begin reducing power-based personal violence on our campus? How many of us need to add 2 or 3 or 7 or 50 dots

to this map to begin to make a difference and begin to outshine and displace those red dots? We cannot know the exact number, but we do know this: if most

of us choose inaction – If most of us choose to close our eyes to this issue – if most of us choose apathy and indifference – then the red dots stand! If we do not begin replacing moments of violence and inaction with moments of support and safety, then we will surely continue to have our partners, friends and co-workers become victims of violence. That is not OK. That must not be OK with any of us.

Preferred Name



Members at Stockton have completed over <u>100,000 hours of community service</u> and raised over <u>\$300,000 for various charitable organizations</u> in the past five years.

Requirements for joining include: completion of 12 credits, full-time status, a minimum 2.50 GPA.

Students who choose to become members of these unrecognized groups may not obtain all of the benefits available to those who join a recognized fraternity or sorority.



From Northern New Jersey

Take Garden State Parkway south. Take Exit 44. Turn right onto Pomona Road. Go 1/2 mile. Make left onto Vera King Farris Drive. Parking on the right in lots 1-5.

From Camden/Philadelphia Area

Take Atlantic City Expressway to Exit 12. Turn left. Proceed straight and pass light at Route 30 (White Horse Pike) to the next traffic light at Jim Leeds Road, turn right - go 1 mile on Jim Leeds Road to Vera King Farris Drive. Turn left and continue about 1 1/2 miles. Parking available on left in lots 1-5.

From Southern New Jersey

Drive north on the Garden State Parkway to exit 41. Make left onto to Jimmie Leeds Road, travel one mile and make a right onto Vera King Farris Drive and proceed 1 1/2 miles. Parking on left in lots 1-5.

From Atlantic City Area

Travel west on Route 30 (White Horse Pike) for about 10 miles to Pomona Shopping Center. Turn right onto Pomona Road (Rt. 575N), at next light, turn right onto Jimmie Leeds Road and travel about 1 mile, and make a left onto Vera King Farris Drive and proceed 1 1/2 miles. Parking on left in lots 1-5.


